Hicksville Sears Site Sold Again

The ill-fated 27-acre site of the former Sears department store, on North Broadway - Route 106-107 in Hicksville, has been sold again.

The Seritage Growth Properties group is set to sell their now vacant property in Hicksville to Steel Equities of Bethpage.

Seritage had initially planned a \$200 million redevelopment of the land - with 425 apartments and parking for 2300 cars - which was scheduled for a hearing on March 10, 2020. The Hearing was canceled due to the Covid pandemic, which hit the United States that week.

The Seritage plan was blasted by local residents who denounced the plan as “much too big.”

“Isn't Hicksville crowded enough?” posted one resident. If the site were developed in accordance with the residential zoning of the adjoining neighborhoods, the site would be developed into 65 single-family homes, on 1/3 acre lots, with a neighborhood park, and some commercial frontage on North Broadway.

The Seritage plan included a multi use space for restaurants, apartments, a movie theater, a grocery store, and a fitness club.

The project, titled “Heritage Village” was to be the subject of hearings from the town of Oyster Bay. Those hearings were cancelled after Seritage opted not to move forward with redevelopment plans.

Steel Equities, based in Bethpage won the bid for the area. According to industry insiders, Seritage Growth Properties could be seeking \$52 million for the property.

“To ensure it is consistent with market conditions, our own realigned goals and business objectives, and reflects our discussions with community and government leaders,” read an official company statement from Seritage. “COVID has clearly altered the landscape for the entire real estate industry.”

Steel Equities previously acquired two abandoned Sears stores from the Long Island area, including the Smith Haven Mall in Lake Grove location, which they acquired for \$28 million, and the Franklin Avenue in Garden City location. Both locations have since been leased out.

Kevin McCarthy Campaigns on North Shore for Nick LaLota

Republican US House Minority leader Kevin McCarthy came to Long Island last week to campaign and fundraise for Nick LaLota the Republican nominee for Congress in New York's First Congressional District.

"Being here should show to the rest of the district that Nick LaLota's race is very important to us - and we're going to do everything in our power to help him," McCarthy said.

McCarthy hosted a lunch for LaLota in St James, and joined him in addressing the economic, crime and border crises hitting our country.

"We have to elect Nick LaLota here on Long Island," stated McCarthy. "Nick is a family man, a military veteran and graduate of the United States Naval Academy. He will fight for the kinds of common sense policies - a stable economy, a secure border, and a no-nonsense approach to stopping the surge in crime - that we need for this country."

McCarthy is tapped by most election experts to become the next Speaker of the US House of Representatives. The Republicans currently hold 212 seats in the 435 member House of Representatives, and only need six more

to take the majority. Reapportionment and redistricting should have already moved 10 seats from Democrat to Republican, and historically, midterm elections favor the party not occupying the White House.

Retaining the seat in the First congressional district is important to the Republicans' goal of regaining the majority of the seats in the House of Representatives.

The First District is currently held by Representative Lee Zeldin who is running for Governor of New York State. He has held the seat since he was first elected in November 2014. Zeldin defeated Democrat Nancy Goroff 205,715 votes to 169,294 votes in the 2020 Election based on Numbers from the New York State Board of Elections.

The new First district consists of Huntington, Smithtown, Port Jefferson, and the East End of Long Island.

Santos Aide Arrested in Sex Attack on Boy

A top aide to US congressional candidate George Santos was arrested by Nassau Police for the sexual assault of a 10-year-old boy.

Arrested is "Harry" Brar, age 29 of Levittown, who was taken into custody last week.

Brar is a top aide to Santos, the Republican candidate in the 3rd congressional district, which includes most of Oyster Bay, North Hempstead, and a portion of northeast Queens. Brar is a frequent companion of Santos, serving as Santos' Asian outreach coordinator and on his Finance Committee.

According to police, Brar was at the home of the woman and her 10-year old son, when he disappeared into the boy's bedroom. The woman then heard yelling and ran to the bedroom to find Brar - in the child's bed on top of the boy - strangling and hitting the boy, and telling him to keep quiet.

The woman tried to drag Brar off the boy, and Brar hit her too, before then fleeing from the house.

Brar then allegedly threatened the woman to keep quiet and not tell police -

telling her that as an immigrant from a conservative culture, it "would be a disgrace" for her if the attack went public. Sources report that Brar allegedly then sent the woman text messages trying to minimize his assault on the boy.

Brar was charged with "criminal obstruction of breathing/strangulation, assault and endangering the welfare of a child.." according to Nassau County police.

Santos has not issued any statement on the arrest, and the two were seen together at several recent public events.

Murdered EMT Captain Laid to Rest in Huntington

Last Wednesday, the body of Capt. Alison Russo-Elling, of Huntington, was carried to her funeral on Long Island by an ambulance, not a hearse. It was an appropriate gesture by her fellow first responders: In her twenty-four years with the New York City Emergency Medical Service, and as an active volunteer in the Huntington Community First Aid Squad, Capt. Russo-Elling transported thousands of ailing New Yorkers to area hospitals by ambulance, saving their lives.

"Allie would always put others' lives before hers," said one of her co-workers, Deputy Chief Gregg Brady. Her colleagues all called her Allie, he said, and she called them "the kids."

She was accompanied to her final rest by hundreds of emergency workers. Russo-Elling was murdered a few days earlier, stabbed to death in what appears to be a another "random act of violence" outside her station in Astoria, Queens.

Captain Russo-Elling had earned commendations and medals for bravery and service, including for her response to the World Trade Center attacks on /11 and her tireless service during the initial phase of the COVID pandemic.

In all, Captain Russo-Elling likely responded to more than 25,000 emergency calls during her career, said the city's acting fire commissioner, Laura Kavanagh, adding: "She helped her city in its darkest days."

She was only a half block from her station house in Astoria when a deranged man, Peter Zisopoulos, 34, ran up to her, pushed her to the ground and stabbed her to death. He was arraigned last week,

charged with second-degree murder and fourth-degree criminal possession of a weapon.

Rep. Lee Zeldin (R-Long Island), the Republican candidate for governor, said last week that while the lack of mental health treatment is a problem, the murder reflects a violent crime wave unleashed by the Democrat's "no-bail" laws.

"We are all mourning the death of Captain Allison Russo-Elling," stated Zeldin. "And now we hear about a man stabbed to death on the L train. People are walking these streets in fear - and will now take an Uber for two blocks, rather than walking."

"Thousands of times in her career, her sirens sang out loudly" stated EMS chief, Lillian Bonsignore said at the service. "Our sirens will continue to sing - a reminder to all. The best - just like Alison - are on the way."

Levar Butts Arrested for Drug Dealing

Suffolk police arrested Levar Butts, age 27, for running an illegal Fentanyl drug trafficking operation in Huntington.

Butts was once a star quarterback for the Huntington Blue Devils high school football team, during the 2014 season.

He was arrested by Suffolk Police at his home in Huntington Station, and was found in possession of both a commercial quantity of the illegal drug Fentanyl and an illegal loaded handgun.

The police had tracked Butts' drug dealing operation, and secured Warrants to raid his home and his remote drug dealing locations.

Butts was arrested and charged with second-degree criminal possession of a weapon: loaded firearm, third-degree criminal possession of a weapon, third-





degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, fourth-degree criminal possession of narcotic drugs, and second-degree criminal use of drug paraphernalia.

He was arraigned on September 29th - and under the new New York "no-bail" laws - was immediately released.

LEE ZELDIN FOR GOVERNOR

The destructiveness of Governor Kathy Hochul and her one-party Democratic Party state government has reached a tipping point.

Over two million New Yorkers have left - just moved away. Its harder and harder to survive - as a business, as a working person, or as a family. Violent crime is skyrocketing, with criminals turned loose after arrests for violent crimes. 25% of small businesses have been destroyed - each one a family's life's work gone. Just walking down the street is now life-threatening with released criminals and violent drug addicts everywhere.

A refusal to repeal the "no-bail" law that forces judges to let loose virtually every criminal arrested in New York. Hochul has run New York's government like a mob boss - shaking down businesses, siccing her regulators on political opponents, and doling out tens of billions to her crony favorites.

New York is at the breaking point. That is no exaggeration: Over 30% of New Yorkers are now planning to move-out to Florida or the Carolinas. That means a collapse of real estate values, business customers, and revenues. It means we will become Detroit - or worse.

Congressman Lee Zeldin (R-Long Island) is the last hope for New York. He is a solid, mainstream Republican. He is anti-crime, pro-business, and pro-parents, and pro-jobs. Zeldin has been in the US Congress since 2014, and was a State Senator for four years.

This is not one of those "nuanced" elections fought over marginal tax rates and a few social programs. This is about New York's salvation or destruction. And that's no joke.

Op-Ed: How does a Governor Have the Power to Ban all Cars?

In an astounding announcement, New York Governor Kathy Hochul announced that she would ban all gasoline and diesel powered vehicles by 2035.

These enormously sweeping rules will affect the life of just about every New Yorker - in a profound way.

The question arises as to how a single individual, even a governor, working in concert with un-elected bureaucrats can have such vast power as to impose such a mandate on 19 million New Yorkers.

Shouldn't our elected representatives in the state legislature have a say on such a drastic change in our lifestyles?

Whether or not you think the policy is good or bad, the problem is whether we are investing too much power in one individual.

The Supreme Court earlier this year knocked down a wide sweeping regulation implemented by the Environmental Protection Agency which would have required massive additions to the manufacturing of new cars to lower carbon emissions. The proposal would have added \$3,800 to the cost of each car. The court struck down the regulation on the ground that this was something Congress had to implement.

While the federal agency was kept in check by the court, New York's agencies continue to run wild.

Electric vehicle advocates are preaching that this is a "win-win." But they do not evaluate the cost of these vehicles to already financially strapped New Yorkers.

They don't explain whether or not our already overburdened electric grid will be able to handle all of these millions of people plugging in their cars at

the same time.

They don't properly explain how there will be a reduction in carbon emissions when the power generated to charge the vehicles comes overwhelmingly from the burning of fossil fuels at our power plants.

The point is, we can all have an intelligent debate on the pros and cons of this issue, but ultimately it should be our state legislature that makes the final determination. It should not be a bunch of nameless, faceless bureaucrats we have never heard of, who owe us no accountability.

Leader Reporter Wins International Press Freedom Award

The Assistant Editor of the Leader, Chris O'Neill, received the prestigious "Door to Freedom" award, for his "courageous work in journalism and for Freedom of the Press," by the NNW International Film Festival held in Gdynia, Poland.

The NNW International Film Festival is the largest of its kind in Europe, and is short for the Polish words: "Unbowed, Unbroken and Tenacious."

The Festival is a unique event in Europe, focused on cinema and history. The festival's focus is on "history on the screen" and includes special events to meet those who documented or played a part in crucial historical events.

The 2022 theme was the "Road to Freedom," as told in "documentaries, para-documentaries, fictionalized accounts, short films, videos, radio auditions, full-length films and discussions."

During the four-day festival, the thousands of attendees enjoyed the experience of over 100 films, plus discussions that included many of the journalists, historical figures, and witnesses to history who made the films and whom the films portray.

There were various awards in the different categories of film, and special awards for "witnesses to history." Twenty one such awards were given out this year, including three posthumously and four to persons over age 90.

In addition to writing for - and editing - the Leader, O'Neill was active as an

underground journalist for the Polish anticommunist opposition press in Poland, under Soviet occupation, in the 1980s and 1990s. He was then a Fulbright Scholar in Poland studying at the Catholic University of Lublin.

O'Neill was presented the award by Jan Lorys, longtime director of the Polish Museum of America, in Chicago. Lorys is the son of Maria Mirecka-Lorys, legendary commander-in-chief of the National Women's Military Union founded in 1944 to fight the communists. She died this year at nearly 107 years of age, organizing help for Poles in Ukraine, almost until the end.

"It was a very humbling experience to receive this award with so many great heroes of recent history," stated O'Neill. "Good journalism means telling the truth, and not being afraid to do and write the right thing - even if a despotic government like the Soviet Union disapproves."

After 2 ½ years closed due to the Covid pandemic - and then extended delays to re-open - the Cinema Arts Center in Huntington finally re-opened last month, with a notably leftist selection of films – including the widely-panned films “Bros” and “Battlefield” - and an upcoming two-day “woke” political program on “Right-wing Extremism” in America.

The Extremism program will be held on November 4th and 5th and will include films on “radicalization in America, hate speech in media..., bioethics, right-wing extremism, women’s rights..., vaccine misinformation, and Internet radicalization...,” according to a statement from the Center.

The Center's "Extremism" program will feature two films: “White Noise” (2020) and “Personhood” (2019), which “explore the topics of right-wing extremist influencers, and the policing of pregnant women in America,” according to the Center.

The Center will host several seminars around the films, including the producers and directors of the films, and left-wing authors and journalists from media groups such as the Huffington Post.

The Center’s Extremism Conference is being held, coincidentally, on the week-


end right before the November elections.

“It is vital our community understands the implications of extremism and its destructive consequences,” stated Jacquelyn Strayer, a member of the Center’s Board of Trustees.

The Center is taxpayer supported, with a very below-market lease (approximately \$3,300 per month) of Town of Huntington public facilities, and additional direct taxpayer subsidies to the facility. The Center has three theaters, a Lobby, and a 1,200 square foot restaurant and conference space where the Center serves food and alcoholic drinks.

Film critic, political pundit and author John Podhoretz once said, “I look at ‘The New York Review of Books. It’s what it has been for 35 or 40 years, which is a highly sophisticated vehicle for anti-American self-hatred.”

One hopes that the Cinema Arts Center is not headed down that same path.



The garden was decorated with tent-like structures and lamps and other Moroccan décor.

Ladies wore long dresses, but one guest, Diana Collins, was wearing a dress and boots that she purchased when she was in Morocco and noted that her outfit was the real thing.

Diana Collins said, "The food was delicious, cooked by the hosts, who are known for their culinary prowess."

Susan Peterson, was there with her Goddaughter, Megan Young, who was visiting from Los Angeles, also raved about the wonderful authentic Moroccan food, and the conversation with the many fascinating guests "people were having such a good time that the evening went quite late." Dean Yoder described the menu which consisted of "creamed cucumber soup with a basil oil emulsion, served in a shot glass with frozen lemon granita shavings on top, on the same plate was a singlet of Belgian endive with a soft creamy goat cheese studded with a wafer of crisped parmesan. The second course

was a traditional Moroccan pastilla done with aromatics of cinnamon, fresh ginger, toasted slivered almonds and white flaked chicken, all wrapped in a buttery phyllo pastry and cooked until golden brown. It was then dusted with powdered sugar and fine ground cinnamon. Accompanied on the plate with a simple dressed rocket salad. The main course was a chicken Tagine over couscous. The chicken boneless chicken thighs cooked with raisins, Vidalia onions cinnamon, coriander seed, garam masala and a bit of honey. The couscous was studded with roasted pistachios and accompanied by small steamed and seasoned yellow squash bundles and honey with butter cooked carrots. The whole dish was lightly sauced with cool yogurt, chopped fresh mint and pomegranate seeds. This dish was the evening favorite and was served with a rich red Spanish wine. Dessert was assorted berries, raspberries, gooseberries, blackberries and strawberries, on a white meringue cloud with homemade lemon curd and fresh vanilla whipped cream, served with champagne. The night was crowned with fireworks provided by the country club behind our house. The night was magic!"
