# The Travesty of the Flynn **Prosecution**

And the Mueller investigation then tried to use their new leverage over Flynn to try to destroy Trump.

### UNDERSTANDING OUR HISTORY

To the Editor:

As our nation struggles to redefine itself amid massive protests in our streets, the stories of our museum may provide a compelling and useful mirror.

The Townsends of 1776 were committed revolutionaries -- dreamers, perhaps -- who risked everything for the self-determination. right to Nevertheless, those same Townsends also held about nineteen people as their personal property, denying them the right to keep their own children, let alone to cast a hopeful eye on the "unalienable rights" of "Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness" proclaimed in the Declaration Independence.

The Townsends were far from alone in this. In 1703, 40 percent of New Yorkers held people in slavery. Records show that 16 percent of New Yorkers were enslaved African Americans. Every municipality including Oyster Bay was required by New York State law to employ a person whose job it was to whip slaves, and Oyster Bay's town records list the names of several of those men. Raynham Hall holds in its collection a blacksmith's ledger with an entry for the repair of the manacles on the town whipping post. Arguments that northern slave owners were more humane than their southern cousins are undermined by the apparent need for a whipping post, and by the hundreds of runaway slave ads in Long Island and New York City newspapers of the peri-

These are historical facts. Many visitors to Raynham Hall, including teachers shepherding classes on field trips, are unaware of these facts. These visitors tell us that they are amazed by what they have learned, and by the very idea that they had not previously learned this history, which has only been hiding in plain sight.

Ultimately, we as educators believe that the unjustified use of force by some in law enforcement, more visible now with the incontrovertible evidence of a system that must change before our nation can live up to its founding ambitions. For example, the Wall Street Journal last year reported that one public school in an affluent Long Island district spent \$37,600 per child in 2016-17, while in the neighboring town, whose school population is largely black and brown, the public expenditure per child was only \$24,500. Similar disparities in education, housing, health outcomes and every other measure of well-being reflect a social bias many people are unaware of and would deny exists.

From our nation's founding as a refuge for rebels and opportunity-seekers in the 17th century, we have often been perceived as a beacon for freedom and democracy in the world. But how can we reconcile our identity as the nation that welcomes the world's "huddled masses yearning to breathe free" with George Floyd's and Eric Garner's jarringly opposite, shocking, dying plea, "I can't breathe"?

The demonstrations in communities throughout the nation, by people of all colors, despite the real dangers of gathering in the midst of a pandemic, give us hope that this time of reckoning will finally become the time when we can truly begin to live up to our founding, revolutionary, promise.

Raynham Hall Museum is committed to being an educational partner in our community, to faithfully work to uncover, re-discover and convey our true history, and in so doing to help forge a stronger nation for all our people, "with liberty and justice for all."

"This was something that I have wanted to do for a long time, and the timing was right for me in my life. But when I learned that I was a final candidate, I was both excited and a little bit nervous, so I reached out to someone that I knew who had donated a kidney, and she was kind enough to share her experience with me, she put me at ease and I never looked back." Coleen said that all her tests were covered by her insurance, with any additional tests and hospital costs by the recipient's insurance. A donor coordinator had been assigned to her, after she had completed the required paperwork, to guide her through the process. As a healthy person she was only in hospital for two days, and within a few weeks was going about her usual routine. Coleen said "There has never been an ounce of regret with my decision to donate one of my kidneys."

# **OP-ED "DACA Ruling is Totally Illogical"**

The U.S. Supreme Court's decision invalidating President Trump's reversal of former President Obama's DACA executive order was a victory for the illegal immigration lobby, but a stinging blow to common sense and the rule of law.

The grounds upon which the Roberts Court made this decision were ridiculous. The court stopped short of saying that Obama's edict was proper, but struck down Trump's reversal because, supposedly, it did not express an adequate rationale for its order.

"We do not decide whether DACA or its rescission are sound policies," Roberts said. "We address only whether the agency complied with the procedural requirement that it provide a reasoned explanation for its action. Here the agency failed to consider the conspicuous issues of whether to retain forbearance and what if anything to do about the hardship to DACA recipients."

There was indeed – in plain sight – a rational basis for reversing Obama's ruling. It was illegal. That's all we need to know. How do we know it was illegal? Obama himself said so on more than 20 different occasions. In May 2011, the former president admitted he could not "just bypass Congress and change the (immigration) law myself. ... That's not how a democracy works."

There was no further explanation needed by Trump other than this: My predecessor implemented a blatantly illegal executive order that unilaterally halted enforcement of laws passed by Congress, and further illegally bestowed upon individuals living in the nation illegally the right to obtain working papers, in direct contravention of federal law. Because President Obama's order is illegal I am reversing it. PERIOD.

In the court's prime Dissent, Justice Clarence Thomas nailed it. "The majority does not even attempt to explain why a court has the authority to scrutinize an agency's policy reasons for rescinding an unlawful program under the arbitrary and capricious microscope," Thomas said. "The decision to countermand an unlawful agency action is clearly reasonable. So long as the agency's determination of illegality is sound, our

review should be at an end."

Roberts and the court's liberals have no place weighing in on whether Trump's order would inflict hardship on DACA recipients. Frankly, that is none of the court's business. That is for Congress to decide.

This is another quintessential example of an

interventionist, overreaching court making law rather than interpreting law. If the justices don't like the status quo, they should implore Congress to act, not take matters into their own hands.

As Justice Brett Kavanaugh noted: "That uncertainty is a result of Congress' inability thus far to agree on legislation, which in turn has forced successive administrations to improvise, thereby triggering many rounds of relentless litigation with the prospect of more litigation to come," Roberts clearly did not want his court to be the one shedding the protections from deportation that the Obama edict put forth.

But it's not as though the striking down of Obama's decision would have led to mass deportation of DACA youth. The federal government has a hard enough time deporting murderers.

The stripping of the Obama order would simply have placed the matter back into the hands of Congress and provided the president with additional leverage to finally get the type of immigration enforcement measures that are so desperately needed in what has become a quasiborderless nation. Trump has already signified his intent to not only prevent deportation of DACA youth, but to actually provide them with citizenship.

But, he wasn't just going to give it away. He, understandingly, wanted to first make sure that localities ended their illegal sanctuary city policies, implemented E-Verify, ended chain migration and to put in place a barrier at the southern border to prevent the problem from continuing in perpetuity.

Roberts' DACA decision is so bewildering because it contradicts an earlier holding that struck down Obama's

Deferred Action for Parents of Americans and Lawful Permanent Residents program, or DAPA, which sought to grant amnesty and work papers to 4 million older illegal aliens, who were parents to their American born children. That 4-4 split decision was rendered in the midst of a vacancy created by the death of Justice Antonin Scalia. If that Roberts Court held that Obama lacked authority to grant working papers to older illegal aliens, how could it not hold the same for those undocumented of a younger age?

The Fifth Circuit Court stated that the president's unilateral decision not to pursue deportation "does not transform presence deemed unlawful by Congress into lawful presence and confer eligibility for otherwise unavailable benefits based on that change."

Thursday's decision is yet another attempt by Roberts to shoehorn his legal opinion to rationalize his predetermined personal view on the matter. He seems more concerned about the image of the court than in following the law.

The chief justice did the same thing with the Affordable Care Act. Roberts did not want his court to be the one that kicked millions off of Obamacare, thereby earning the wrath of the media and academic elites. So, he concocted a theory that Congress can impose mandates on the people that would ordinarily not be permissible, so long as they taxed those who did not comply. He was the lone "conservative" justice who took that view.


He handed down yet another tortured

bit of logic in siding with liberals in denying the Trump administration from asking a person's citizenship on the Census. Knowing he had no basis to deny the administration from placing the question on the census, Roberts similarly used the administrative process theory as his crutch. "We are presented, in other words, with an explanation for agency action that is incongruent with what the record reveals about the agency's priorities and decisionmaking process," Roberts wrote. "Accepting contrived reasons would defeat the purpose of the enterprise," he added.

How is it proper for Roberts to be injecting himself into the heads of administration officials as to whether they had proper motives for their actions? Either the actions were proper or they were not. If they were proper, it's case closed. Move on. It is becoming more and more apparent that Roberts holds a grudge against the president that emanates from Trump's harsh attacks against previous decisions that did not go his way. Politicians can bloviate. Members of the Supreme Court are supposed to be the grownups. They're not supposed to allow their emotions to dictate their decisions. They're supposed to follow the law. The Roberts court is having a tough time doing so.





# The Brightest Stars of the Oyster Bay High School Class of 2020

Inspired by those who make their mark on the world, Oyster Bay High School Valedictorian Aavi Gupta hopes to be remembered for something great.

"I want to be one of those people who has contributed greatly through their life's work and contributed to human knowledge," he said.

Setting his path for that extraordinary goal, Aavi is headed to Princeton University in the fall to study molecular biology/chemistry. He plans to continue on to medical school to become a physician.

"I've always had an interest in the sciences; going into this major will give me all the tools I need to be successful in my future career, and I will have chances to take part in different research projects and learn about topics that interest me," he said. "At Princeton students in their final year write a senior thesis, a yearlong research project meant to test the knowledge and skills gained through one's course of study," Aavi explained. "Many graduates base their careers on the work they do in this final year, so I would be gaining an incredible amount of knowledge and experience through this," he said. "There are so many opportunities to do so many different things, and I feel Princeton was the best choice for me."

Aavi is graduating Oyster Bay High School with a grade-point average of 110.78 and numerous achievements in academics, music and athletics. He attributes his success to his parents. "My mom has been the driving force in pushing me to get my work done," he said. "Also, once I have my mind set on achieving something, I work as hard as I can to make sure that I get it."

Throughout his high school career, Aavi has taken advantage of nearly all advanced and/or college level classes, and pursued programs at local universities to hone his interests in science. A leader among his peers, he was president of National Honor Society and Mathletes, treasurer for Business Honor Society and historian for Rho Kappa Social Studies Honor Society during his senior year. He was also a member of honor societies for mathematics, science, foreign language, and music. Among his awards, Aavi was a winner in the Walt Whitman Barclay's Association Annual Student Poetry Contest and was awarded for excellence in science and in languages other than English (LOTE), now known as World Languages. He is also proud of having a perfect attendance record.

A two-season athlete, Aavi played varsity tennis and varsity bowling and

earned the Oyster Bay High School Varsity Athletic Award three years in a row. He also spent time outside of school volunteering at the Life Enrichment Center at Oyster Bay.

A trombone player, Aavi has been a member of jazz band and marching band all through high school, a member of symphonic band for three years, and played in wind ensemble this year. One of his greatest high school memories was performing at Carnegie Hall with the Oyster Bay High School Symphonic Band in his sophomore year.

"Performing at Carnegie Hall still feels surreal to me, as if it never happened," he said. "We had a long performance but it felt as though we were only on stage for a few minutes, and this was a rare, once-in-a-lifetime experience for me."

Another high point was going on the tenth-grade college trip.

"The college trip was a great deal of fun; I had a chance to learn about different universities with my friends, and it was one of those rare, unique experiences that I appreciate significantly more now," he said.

Aavi, who attended Theodore Roosevelt Elementary and James H. Vernon schools before Oyster Bay High School, said he is inspired by the work ethic and drive of his teachers.

"The amount of time and effort they spend making their daily lessons and affirming that I understand the lessons is something that I am grateful for," he said. "I'm also grateful for the work ethic my parents instilled in me as I wouldn't be where I am today if not for it."

As he looks to the next chapter of his academic career, Aavi offered several pieces of advice to underclassmen and those entering high school:

"Do everything you want to do in high school. Get the full experience so you don't regret it after you graduate," he said. "Your teachers are here to help; don't think you shouldn't ask questions because it will help you in the long run. Take different classes, even if they appear to be a challenge for you, you could gain a great amount of insight you would've never realized if you had never taken the class," he continued. "Also, don't be afraid to try these things because you could discover something you never knew about yourself."

Aavi also advised underclassmen to try and figure out what career they want to pursue before entering college. "I did plenty of research and attended different programs that taught me about medicine and that proved to me that I wanted to go in that direction," he said. "Of course, it's hard to gauge what you want to do for the rest of your life, but you should figure out your interests and your strong suits and find ways that will allow you to explore that industry and see if it is truly what you want to do."

Ten years from now, Oyster Bay High School Salutatorian Julia Cutajar hopes to be designing buildings and amusement park rides that are perfectly accustomed to those with special needs and/or complex medical conditions.

"Whether it be playing with Lincoln Logs as a child or making furniture, I have always had the urge to create," Julia said. Her passions for art & design and

mathematics, coupled with her years of experience working with those with special needs, have put Julia on a clear path to making the world a better, more inclusive place.

This fall, she will begin her studies in architecture at the University of Notre Dame, an institution she was instantly drawn to because of its "powerful message of being a force for good in the world," Julia said. "Notre Dame has an unparalleled community and network that I know will help me make an impact in the future. I truly appreciate how they stress students being a family and not in competition with one another."

Through volunteering, Julia said she has seen first-hand the limitations those with special needs have in their everyday experiences. "My mission came to be when I volunteered at a children's hospital and saw an inclusive playground," she

said. "I realized that I wanted this inclusivity to go beyond hospital walls and playgrounds."

Julia honed her interest in the field by taking architecture classes at New Jersey Institute of Technology and the Catholic University of America "to solidify that architecture was right for me." A perfectionist at heart, she completed all work, both in and out of school, to the absolute best of her ability and will graduate Oyster Bay High School with a 110.01 grade-point average, after carrying a hefty course load and a busy after-school schedule. "During junior year, I was a media and PR intern at Oakcliff Sailing Center simultaneously with being a stage manager of stage crew. The end of ninth period was only the start of another hectic schedule. Right after school I would go to stage crew, and then run to work, and go back to the school if needed," she

Throughout her high school career, she received numerous awards. Among her greatest academic achievements is receiving the District Attorney's SHIELD Award, given to one junior in each high school in Nassau County who exemplifies service, honesty, integrity, excellence, leadership, and duty. "Most times, students are recognized for academics or sports, but rarely for character. While I am proud to graduate as Salutatorian, I place kindness above academic accolades because that is what I believe truly matters. Years from now, no one will remember your GPA; they will remember the kind of person you were."
