A Talk with Andy Raia

The Leader met this week with Assemblyman Andrew Raia, who is running to succeed his mother Jo-Ann Raia, as the Huntington Town Clerk.

We met at TK's Galley cafe in Halesite, with a sumpuous brunch of eggs, bacon, canadian bacon and blueberry and corn muffins laid out by TK and his helpful staff.

Andy Raia opened by telling us that after serving for 38 years, his mom, Jo-Ann Raia, is retiring. Andy was in eighth grade when his mom was first elected to the position of Town Clerk. He remembers constituents telephoning the home and even stopping by in person to obtain death certificates and voice concerns to his mom. Andy fondly remembers his mom's 'marathon Valentine's Day weddings,' a tradition he plans to continue if elected.

Andy does not consider himself a politician, but rather a public servant. He believes that if he succeeds in November's election that he will be on the front lines dealing directly with his constituents. He looks forward to being caretaker of his mother's legacy as a "great public servant." One of Andys goals if elected includes saving constituents the trip to the town clerk's office. He plans the allowing of credit card payments to be processed online.

Andy was born and raised in Huntington - spending his early years in Fiddler's Green in Lloyd Neck.

After graduating from the State University of New York at New Paltz; he started his professional career as a staff member in legislative offices of the State Assembly, the New York State Senate, and the Suffolk County Legislature. Elected to the New York State Assembly in 2002, he is currently serving his 9th term in the New York State Legislature. He serves as the Ranking Minority Member of the Assembly Health Committee and is also a member of the Environmental Conservation, Insurance, Housing, and Rules Committees.

Assemblyman Raia's long-standing commitment to his constituents and tenure within the New York State legislature have helped him become a leader within the

Assembly. He is currently serving as the Assistant Minority Leader, the Minority representative on the Legislative Council on Health Care Financing, and a member of the Budget Conference Committee on Health. In 2017 he was named the NYS Association of Health Care Providers' 2017 Elected Official of the Year.

Assemblyman Raia now represents the 12th Assembly District which spans the Towns of Huntington, Babylon, and Islip.

In addition to spending his entire professional career in public service, Assemblyman Raia has also served on the Executive Boards of the Huntington Boys and Girls Club, Huntington Freedom Day Care Center, Huntington Station Enrichment Center, Katherine Gibbs, Perspectives on Youths; and Helping Hands.

He is a member of the Northport Historical Society, the Babylon Historical Society, the Huntington Historical Society and the Greenlawn-Centerport Historical Society. Andrew Raia also belongs to many different social organizations which have strong commitments to community service, including the Knights of Columbus Father Thomas A. Judge Council in East Northport where he serves as a Third Degree Knight; the Sons of Italy Constantino Brumidi Lodge in Deer Park; the New York State Conference of Italian-American Legislators; and the Chamber of Commerce.

He is an honorary board member for the Suffolk County Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Building Homes for Heroes. Assemblyman Raia graduated from the Leadership Huntington Foundation Program and was named one of its Graduates of Distinction in 2017. Additionally, he was Long Island Business News' 2008, 40 under 40 Honoree. He also remains an ongoing advocate for programs benefiting our youth including the Boy Scouts of America and the Girl Scouts of America. Andy is an avid boater and fisherman who loves the outdoors. He feels we are "blessed to live in the one of the nicest communities in America.'

As Assemblyman, Andy has been honored to be his constituents voice in Albany. If elected to Town Clerk he looks forward to being a strong voice in town hall.

Drug Dealing Bust in Glen Cove

A 32-year old Glen Cove resident, Miguel Vasquez, was arrested for drug dealing at 3A Park Manor Court, off Sea Cliff Avenue in Glen Cove.

Vazquez was charged with Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance 2nd degree and three counts of Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 3rd degree.

Glen Cove Detectives (Detective lieutenant Nagle, detective Linares, and detective Glennon) executed a search warrant, and seized over 40 grams of cocaine, drug paraphernalia, and U.S. currency.

Vasquez was arraigned in District Court and Glen Cove and is is being held on \$50,000 bail.

"Save Huntington Village" Hearing



Over 300 attended the Town Board Hearing on Zoning in Huntington Village.

Despite the cold rainy night, over 300 Huntington residents jammed a Town Board Hearing on October 16th, to propose new zoning laws and oppose the over-building of Huntington Village.

The Town Hall meeting, began at 7pm and ran until after midnight. Hundreds of residents organized by the "Save Huntington Village" coalition showed their disapproval to the many ugly apartment complexes that are being built around the downtown.

Town Board members Ed Smyth (R) and Eugene Cook (I) joined Supervisor Chad Lupinacci (R) in proposing new zoning rules - a "New Direction" - to severely limit the number of new apartments - and require adequate new parking - that developers can build in Huntington Village.

The Democrats, in 2003, changed the zoning rules to allow apartments over stores, and in 2015, reduced the requirements for adequate parking for new apartments.

But most residents who spoke, favored even tighter rules than the New Direction

proposal. Most residents there proposed new laws to amend the Commercial C6 apartment zoning laws, which aims to reign in apartment buildings sizes and density.

The residents there were supporting tough requirements on zoning changes to limit the building of apartment blocks in Huntington. These requirements are even tougher than the ones previously proposed by Lupinacci.

MaryAnne Hicks, an aide to Councilman Ed Smyth, stated that "residents voiced their opinions," and that Smyth was listening to the residents.

The group "SAVE HUNTINGTON VILLAGE" distributed a flyer, explaining why residents believe that the law needs to be strengthened, or it will "worsen traffic," "further reduce parking" and "increase number of apartments" as some negatives to the situation, and can be seen at "SaveHuntingtonVillage.com."







Frank M. Flower & Sons donated all the oysters to the festival. Proceeds from their shirt sales goes to a local food pantry.





Kennedy: "Bellone has been **AWOL on LIPA**"

A tax reassessment lawsuit by the Long Island Power Authority ("LIPA") threatens to bankrupt the Town of Huntington, Village of Northport and the Northport School District.

But incumbent County Executive Steve Bellone (D-Babylon) has been "doing nothing," according to challenger, Suffolk County Comptroller John Kennedy (R-Smithtown).

Huntington has been fighting LIPA to prevent the potentially devastating

reassessment, filing lawsuits before the Supreme Court to stop LIPA.

Local officials, such Huntington Supervisor Chad Lupinacci (R) have backed the lawsuits against LIPA. Other officials, such as NYS Sen. Jim Gaughran (D-Huntington) and NYS Assemblyman Andrew Raia (R-Huntington) have bi-partisan state legislation to stop or limit the impact of LIPA's actions. Bellone, however, has been notoriously absent during these proceedings.

"I will take action immediately," stated "The Kennedy. Governor controls the LIPA Board. Bellone brags about being close to the Governor, but he has done nothing.'

"A 30% tax increase would devastate this community" stated one longtime resident of Northport. "Where is Steve Bellone - he's hiding somewhere. Bellone doesn't care about us - the middle class of Huntington and Northport."

The issue surrounds the attempted tax reassessment of LIPA's Northport pow-

erplant. The plant provides electricity for 1.1 million residents. The power plant is assessed at \$3.4 billion and pays about \$84 million in property taxes annually. Those property taxes are the largest single tax payment in Huntington and are about 35% of the Northport-East Northport School District budget. If LIPA gets its way - and cuts its tax payment by over 90% - then all other residents will see huge 35%-plus tax increases to make up the difference.

In addition, LIPA is seeking a

"refund" of "overpaid" past taxes amounting to \$650 million, which would bankrupt the Town of Huntington, the Northport - East Northport School District and Northport Village.

LIPA is a government agency, currently headed by Ralph Suozzi - the former Glen Cove Mayor and cousin of US Congressman Tom Suozzi (D-Glen Cove). LIPA Chair Ralph Suozzi refused to return calls to comment on this issue.

Bellone appointed his Deputy County Executive Jon Kaiman last June to "mediate" between LIPA and the residents Huntington, but has not taken sides in support

of the Huntington residents. LIPA refuses to engage in the proposed mediation.

"I call on LIPA to come to the table, work with our local elected officials to come to a reasonable agreement that will be fair..." stated Kennedy. "When elected, I will get the back taxes off the table... and push forward for our residents."

At 5:30 PM, our kids are offered a balanced meal supplied by Long Island Cares. The meals vary throughout the week and incorporate a protein, a carbohydrate, a fruit, a vegetable, and milk,providing the calories and nutrients needed by growing children.

Another important piece of learning about healthy eating at the Club is our cooking program.

To encourage our kids to limit the amount of fast food they eat each week, we recognize that young people need to learn the ABCs of cooking simple, healthy and economic meals for themselves and their families. As part of our Building Great Futures project, we will be able to improve on this program with the addition of a professional teaching kitchen. The Kitchen willbe dedicated to the memory of Michael Maroni, a loyal Club alumnus who owned and founded Maroni's of Northport, one of Long Island's finest restaurants. The Club's Maroni Kitchen will give kids a chance to gain hands on training as they learn the basics in the kitchen. It will include commercial appliances, a teaching island, and overhead mirrors. Classes in healthy eating and cooking skills will open our kids' eyes to the culinary arts and other potential careers. The kitchen will be designed to ensure the safety of our young chefs.

Combining a knowledge of nutrition and cooking with a proper balance of physical fitness and positive relationships, members of our Club will be well on their way to reaching their full potential and to enjoying a healthy life.


