Tecumseh Ceaser is a Native American artist and cultural consultant of Matinecock Turkey clan, Wampanoag, Montaukett, and Blackfoot descent. Born and raised in Queens, NY, the homeland of the Matinecock, he works in the traditional medium and practice of quahog shell (wampum) carving. Tecumseh's goal is to

bring exposure to the indigenous groups of Queens and Long Island and draw attention to the fact that Native American culture and art are not stagnant. He frequently collaborates with local tribes to bring cultural programming to their communities. As a cultural consultant and Native activist he currently serves as an advisor for the Global Indigenous Youth Caucus at the United Nations, where he advocates for Indigenous Americans' rights to member states, NGOs, and other indigenous nations. Tecumseh has also provided cultural education to universities, museums, and institutions including St. John's University, Socrates Sculpture Park, Flushing Town Hall, and New York University. Veterans Day in GC



Tragic Fire in Bayville

A massive house fire in Bayville killed an elderly woman and left her husband critically injured on Monday. The fire started around 2:00 PM at Bayville Park Boulevard, at the corner of Ash Court, in Bayville.

The elderly couple, were confined to "wheelchairs and walkers" according to police. There were wheelchair ramps at the entrances to the house.

After the fire began, a badly-burned the man escaped the house and was calling for help. A neighbor, Kevin Moore, responded with several other neighbors. "He was outside on the lawn and had apparently gotten himself out of the house. He was lying on the ground on his back - burned - and he said "My wife is still inside by the front door."

But the flames, and heat prevented Moore or anyone else from going into the house. "The house was getting hotter and the windows were breaking" from the intense flames and heat, said Moore.

Over 100 firefighters from eight

departments - including helicopter support - responded to the fire.

Pronounced dead at the scene was the woman. Her husband, is in intensive care at Nassau County Medical Center, according to police. In addition, three firefighters were injured, and were treated at Glen Cove Hospital.

Neighbors commented that "they are such a very nice family that have lived there over for 55 years."

REINFORCING KURDISTAN

In a reversal of a short-lived foreign policy move, the Trump administration has committed to leaving 600 US troops in Syrian Kurdistan, in northeastern Syria, and has deployed new heavy weapons - Bradley Fighting Vehicles - to reinforce those US troops.

On October 6, 2019, President Trump had a conference call with Turkish President Recep Erdogan, and agreed to withdraw US troops from certain areas adjacent to the Turkish-Syrian border. Three days later, the US troops withdrew, and Turkey began a military offensive into the areas vacated by the Americans.

The move came under widespread criticism - for abandoning the Kurdish population and its army - the Peshmerga - to Turkish attack. The Kurdish Peshmerga has been an ally of America since the late 1980's, and fought alongside America in both Gulf Wars, and the military campaign to defeat the terror "Caliphate" of ISIS.

President Trump's strongest Congressional allies, such as US Senators Mitch McConnell, Lindsey Graham and Marco Rubio, were among the strongest critics of the new withdrawal policy - and Trump seems to have heard their message. The American withdrawal has stopped, US forces are being reinforced, and the Turkish incursion ceased after one week.

In the Treaty of Sevres of 1920 - which ended World War One between the allies and Ottoman Turkey - the Kurds were promised their own country. They were later betrayed - divided between Britain, France, and Turkey - and never got their independence. Today, some 45 million strong, they are the largest nationality without their own country.

The Leader has long argued that the pro-American Kurds of Iraq and Syria - already de facto independent with their own flag and army - should be recognized as independent. As an American ally, Kurdistan is an "unsinkable aircraft carrier" with its own army to protect itself, bordering the unstable region of Iran, Iraq, Syria and Turkey. The US national security interests in the region, and the moral reasons for not abandoning an ally, weigh in favor of our partnership with the Kurds. *The Leader* applauds the wise move by President Trump to stay engaged in Kurdistan.

That all being said, I love being a commuter and I think Hofstra is a great university. College, overall, has taught me to expand my thinking, try new things, and meet new people. So what would I tell people who aren't sure about college and what major to study? It doesn't matter in the end. Life will work out for you, just stay in school as long as you can.
